Barriers and Enablers to Primary Care Access for Equity-Deserving Populations in Ontario

Research Background

Primary care is a foundational part of the healthcare system. It acts as a point of first contact for patients and serves as a conduit for other types of care (e.g., specialty care), and is importantly positioned as enabling continuity of care for patients. Despite its important role in providing care to patients, evidence indicates that some equity-deserving groups face the greatest barriers accessing primary care. For example, racialized and 2SLGBTQ+ adults are less likely to have a family doctor.

Purpose and Methods

Wellesley Institute has conducted a scoping review of literature on barriers and enablers to primary care for equity seeking groups in Ontario to better understand inequities. **As a follow up, the next phase of our research is a qualitative study that will expand on and identify additional themes from the scoping review.** This qualitative study will involve key informant interviews and focus groups with healthcare providers and community members from racialized and 2SLGBTQ+ communities. This research will answer the following questions: (1) what barriers do economically marginalized, racialized and 2SLGBTQ+ populations experience accessing primary care in Ontario? (2) what can be done at the organizational- and health system- levels to facilitate improved access for these populations?

- Have challenges accessing primary care
